The city's Biblical link is to the patriarch Abraham who left Ur to settle in the land of Canaan.

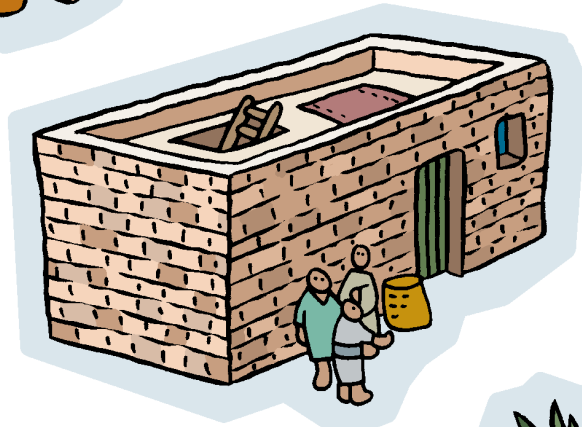
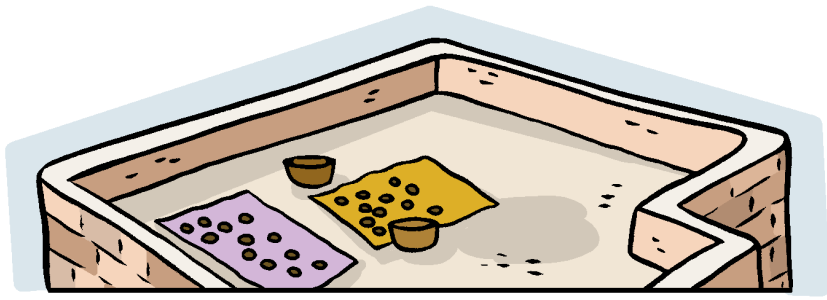
